Towards this end, there is a need to modify the learning culture among students, primarily the being taught" attitude. This attitude has to be molded into a "how-to-learn" attitude.

Traditional methods of learning and teaching are no longer adequate. In these changing times, there is a definite need to revamp teaching and learning methods if we are not to be left behind. Since e-learning requires a lot of independent self-study, we are in fact talking about how we can revitalize traditional methods of learning, rather than completely doing away with them. We must find the most effective ways to integrate e-learning into traditional learning methods.

Ladies and gentlemen,

There is a lot of work to be done if we as a nation are to move towards an elearning society. We need to start with the building of an e-learning strategy, a master plan perhaps which would have a greater possibility of success. I foresee that the relevant organizations would need to consider the following issues in the light of ensuring the fruition of any strategies pertaining to elearning:

- New approaches to e-learning. These would include fresh, new and creative instructional strategies in regards to the provision of courseware and business simulations, and the knowledge management that provides informational databases and performance support tools.
- Learning architecture. This would serve to coordinate e-learning with the rest of the organization's learning and training efforts.
- Infrastructure. This pertains to the use of the organization's technological capabilities to deliver and manage e-learning. This must surely include general web access to learning management systems. The repercussions of an inferior infrastructure can never be underestimated.
- Learning culture, management ownership, and change management.
 These include the creation of an organizational environment that actually

encourages e-learning. This must be supported by the commitment of senior management of the training organisation. An e-learning champion and role model will certainly work wonders for the process of integrating e-learning in any organization.

 Reinventing the training management. This entails the adoption of an organizational and business model which will support rather than hinder the growth of e-learning.

Ladies and gentlemen,

The launching of this event is consistent with the government's mission towards the actualization of Malaysia into a fully-developed nation by the year 2020. We have, without a doubt, the means to achieve this vision. Geographically, we are strategically located, and we possess the political leadership and high literacy rate to bolster our goal.
